Culture of Consent

Public service announcement from your loving Flurry directors.

Flurry Goers!

We strive for a strong culture of consent at The Flurry. This means that all actions, on and off the dance floor, should be consensual. This includes "little" things like asking your partners if they wish to be dipped or picked up, and bigger things like not making unwanted advances on others. This goes for all genders. Please treat everyone with kindness and respect. If you find yourself in a situation where you do not feel your are being treated appropriately by someone at the festival, and you feel you need help managing the situation, please seek out site services (folks in the bright vests working all over the place) and ask for their help contacting the appropriate people to help you out. You can also request help at the Information Table (located in the City Center Lobby) and they will contact the appropriate people to help you. While we hope there are no situations where this is warranted, we are here to help and would like to create a safe space for everyone to dance and have fun!

What can you do to promote a culture of consent?

- Be a role model of consensual behavior:
- Be respectful of your partners and friends.
- Don't make assumptions about what someone else might want.
- Ask questions of your dance partners and people in your circle.

For example:

- Dip?
- Lift?
- Do we have a mutual attraction thing going on?
- Is it okay if I
- Respect without question that "No" means no. *And so on.*

If someone is interacting with you in a way that you are not comfortable with, use your voice. For example:

- No
- Stop
- I don't like that.
- A hand up to signal a stop. And so on.

If you are dancing with someone, or interacting with them in another way, and you are uncomfortable in a way that is not manageable with words, *you have the right to remove yourself from the situation*, even if it's in the middle of the dance. Your personal safety is more important than the flow of a dance. If you experience this level of problem with a fellow dancer please report to site services so that we can help further.

Let's all be kind and respectful and have an amazing Flurry!

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

In Memory of Jack Long

Some people make quite an impression. Mention the name Jack Long to those who have been around the local dance community for a while, and you'll get a fond smile and a grin.

Jack worked as a festival volunteer for many years, and encouraged new dancers to become involved with the local dance community. Flurry Founder Paul Rosenberg recalls meeting Jack in the Festival's early years: "My first memory of meeting Jack Long was sitting next to him at the Western Diner on Route 20 in Guilderland, about a mile from the Festival site (Farnsworth Middle School) circa 1992. Even though he just recently



had started dancing, it was as if he had been in our dance community for many years. He told stories and jokes for what seemed like several hours, and he continued in that role until his death at age 84 in October of 2016.

Jack was a constant presence at the Flurry Festival, Old Songs Festival, regular dances in the Albany area and festivals in the northeast. His laid-back, folksy demeanor helped to welcome many newcomers into contra dancing. It's hard to imagine a Flurry or other dance event in this region without Jack, but I will always remember Jack fondly, and with humor!"

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


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The Program A-Z: What each session is about

SHOE RECOMMENDATIONS

For Your Safety: Shoes are required on dance floors. Wear clean, non-street shoes on ALL dance floors (i.e. dance shoes, or shoes that have not worn outside). Sturdy athletic shoes are recommended for hard vinyl floors in City Center Rooms A and B/C (all other floors are wood).

Here are descriptions of program sessions, arranged alphabetically by title of session. For a chronological schedule by location, please refer to the centerfold pages with pink edges.

- (C) Chat: Led discussion, sharing.
- (D) Participatory Dancing: Leader provides walk-thrus and prompting.

Nicholas Williams and Alex Kehler, two accomplished multi-instrumentalists, share a passion for music rooted in Scandinavian and Celtic traditions, playing with the raw energy of dance musicians, or the subtlety of a chamber ensemble, with rich vocal harmonies thrown into the mix. Nyckelharpa (Swedish keyed fiddle), wooden flute, piano and button accordions, fiddle, piano, and låmandola are all featured in their colorful musical palette. These two musicians from the Eastern Townships have vast teaching experience and can be found leading workshops and master classes on festival stages and at music camps. Their debut CD, First Frost, with the collaboration of Yann Falquet, was released in October 2015. Nicholas Williams is a member of Crowfoot and Genticorum, and has been performing and playing for Contra, Québécois, English, and Scottish dances, for 15 years. He travelled to Göteberg, Sweden, to study with the pioneering flute player Jonas Simonson. Every February, for the past 30 years, a large group of likeminded people gather for two and half days of dance, music. community and winter fun. Though indoors, the "heat" it generates can easily dissuade any cold outdoor conditions the Northeast can produce. This is The Flurry, and thanks to a musician friend's suggestion, I became aware and involved with it 10 years ago. This gathering is pre-meditated, from careful, feedback-driven planning and execution by a group of paid and volunteer people that comes together to bring it on each year. I'd heard of The Flurry from neighbors who mentioned the need to reserve their hotel room for next year, the day after the festival concluded. My friend coaxed, "How about giving back to your community?" Advice well taken. I have not regretted joining, and in addition gained the expansion of friendship and musical comradery networks.

The Flurry has something for everyone -- dancers, musicians, performers, storytellers, children, craftspeople, and all who want to experience a fun-filled community gathering each February.



Centered around several large dance spaces, are workshops, food, performances and my favorite -- impromptu jamming. I'm not a dancer, but I do love to play and listen to Traditional Folk/Appalachian music, better known as "Old Tyme."

The Committee that implements all of this, puts in mountains of hours. It all comes off without a hitch, and attendees spend their two and a half days smiling, sweating and swirling around the indoor venues. I'm amazed at each year's talent, both local and from afar. There's been tributes to past icons, (Pete Seeger, former callers, Paul Rosenberg, etc.), workshops that teach Eastern European dance, and Grammy award winning (equiv.) bands from Canada.


The Flurry can recharge a person's soul, especially in mid-February, in the brunt of cold, dark and hopefully snow-filled days (excuse my bias) that pre-occupy the lives of people in the Northeast. It's a way to connect with friends (some seen only each Flurry), have a family outing, and saturate yourself with good, safe, ice-free aerobic activity (if you dance). Sure beats a gym outing, watching a heart-rate monitor while peddling a bike going nowhere, serenaded by blaring music. Yes, a good time, well worth the wait each February.

I've been impressed watching and participating in some special spontaneous occurrences, over the years. I organize Instrument Check and have a great team of volunteers, many of whom return each year. Their diligence offers me some free time during the Flurry, so with instrument in tow, I wander the premises seeking Old Tyme jams. One time, I see a friend's daughter in a glass-walled walkway, and asked, "Can you get your fiddle, so we can play?" We start jamming while others walk by or pause to listen occasionally. Next thing I know, there's a bass setting up, two banjo people milling about thinking of joining in, and then... there's what's his name, the banjo/fiddler who performed with Harry at my friend Janet's house concert last year. O.K. it's getting fun; more people stopping. Guitars have come, some people start dancing. One gets out a board so they can dance on it with percussion. Three hours later, we are wondering where the time went. For me, this is Flurry at its finest -- no plan, no agenda, just good fun and lots of smiling.

Another time, I turned a corner and saw a little girl with two girlfriends and her mom. The girls are ecstatic. The one girl says, "That was the most funnest thing I've done here in forever." Her friends reply, "YEAH, and there were even boys to dance with and they weren't gross!" So, there you have it, from young perspectives, experiencing a lot of fun and laughter. They will likely cherish those memories and return for many years to come, collecting more.

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
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


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
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
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
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
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Pondering 30 Years Of Flurrys

Paul Rosenberg, Founder: DanceFlurry Organization/Flurry Festival



In February 1988, I organized the first "February Dance Flurry Festival" as an extension of my goals of promoting local and regional talent (our twice-monthly contra dances were staffed entirely by local performers at that time) — with the addition of a few "national talent" performers to spice up the festival and to draw in more participants. Hey, we were ahead of our time with the emphasis on "locally grown"! We hired 30 performers and had about 300 participants for the one-day festival. It was the day after a big snow storm, the high temperature was 10 degrees, it was windy, and even the main roads were covered with hard packed snow. Nevertheless, the participants were ecstatic about the festival and encouraged us to make it at least a two-day event at a bigger venue. The first year we used Westmere Elementary School in Guilderland partly because it was fairly easy to find and also because the principal was

a friend of mine. Some local dancers encouraged me to rent Farnsworth Middle School near Westmere for the second vear. This school had also been the

venue of the predecessor event when Old Songs, Inc. had a "Winter Dance Fest" in February 1986.

There have been many changes in the intervening years, beginning with the re-location of the Festival to Saratoga Springs in 1994 after burst water pipes forced us from Farnsworth Middle School. The developments I have been involved with, which I am most proud of, include adding family programming, encouraging jamming, adding music workshops, expanding programming geared to teens, providing a huge variety of dance and music workshops and performances for all throughout the weekend, bringing in legendary elder performers like Frankie Manning and Bob McQuillen, producing two documentaries about the Flurry, and changing the name from "Dance Flurry Festival" to "The Flurry Festival" in order to bring in more non-dancers and also to reflect the breadth of the programming.



It makes me happy that now, 30 years later, the current program director Peter Davis continues to make a very interesting schedule every year, and that the Flurry Managers and volunteers do a great job with running a much-treasured community event. I have to say, it's a pleasure to enjoy lots of sessions without having any responsibilities.




